The Community Progress Makers initiative first launched in 2015 to provide unrestricted, trust-based funding to support visionary organizations that are working to connect low-income communities to greater economic opportunities.

Now in its fourth cohort, the program supports community-based organizations working locally across Citi's footprint. 16 nonprofits working in the greater New York City area are each receiving \$1 million in unrestricted funding over three years as well as access to a learning community, technical assistance and a network of changemakers across the country.

operates throughout New York City's five boroughs as a membership organization of community groups using research, technical assistance, advocacy and grassroots organizing to support affordable housing and economic development initiatives.

SEPA Mujer aims to foster civic engagement and advance the leadership of women and girls in Long Island by providing inclusive access to resources like cash assistance and legal representation.
